

Proposal "A" of 1994

On March 15, 1994, Michigan
voters approved the constitutional
amendment known as Proposal A.
It was designed to limit the growth
in property taxes by the Consumer
Price Index (CPI) until ownership in
the property was transferred. Prior
to Proposal A, property taxes were
based on the State Equalized Value
(SEV), which may fluctuate from year
to year. With the implementation of
Proposal A, property taxes are based
on your property's Taxable Value
(TV).

Taxable Value

In 1994, all properties became "capped." The property's SEV then became the new Taxable Value.
From that point forward, Taxable Value could increase in the following three ways: 1. a transfer of ownership 2. a physical change to the property or 3. a change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) not to exceed 5%.
This is also referred to as the Inflation Rate Multiplier.

Transfer of Ownership

When a transfer of ownership takes place on a property, the Taxable Value is uncapped to the Assessed continued on page 3

Looking Back on 2013 Downtown Mount Clemens

As we look back on the past year in Downtown Mount Clemens, we had several successful new events, as well as business openings, relocations, and developments. Here are some of the highlights of what was new for 2013 in Downtown Mount Clemens...

• The Macomb Music Theatre completed their million-dollar

renovation and opened to rave reviews. The theatre brought a diverse offering of entertainment into our city including national acts such as: Michael Bolton, Kenny Loggins, Hoobastank, Joe Satriani, Howie Mandel, Cheech & Chong, and many others.

- The long awaited opening of the beautiful **Three Blind Mice Irish Pub** took place in October. The pub boasts over 250 craft and world beers, over 130 Whiskeys, Bourbons, and Scotches, traditional pub fare with a creative twist, and live entertainment seven nights a week.
- A new family owned restaurant, The Courthouse Café & Grill, opened at 39 North Main Street. The Courthouse Café & Grill offers traditional homemade Lebanese and American dishes
- ABC Magic Store relocated to a larger store at 69 North Walnut Street. Their new expanded location includes a stage, puppet theater, and an expanded selection of products including more classic and science toys.
- A new sheriff arrived in town as **Chantel's Jailhouse Deli** took over the former Maya's Deli location. Chantel's Jailhouse Deli features made from scratch soups, handcrafted sandwiches, fresh salads, and daily specials in a fun jailhouse themed atmosphere.
- The Peanut Peddler opened their doors at 58 Cherry Street, and carries a wonderful assortment of nuts, seeds, and dried fruits. Keep an eye out for their Peanut Peddler pushing around their vintage peanut cart and selling their products at Downtown Mount Clemens events. Peanut Peddler products are also available in warming boxes at several downtown bars and restaurants.
- Hunch Free purchased and renovated the former Glime Daoust PC building at 25 North Main Street. After moving their digital marketing offices to this grander location, they were featured in Crain's Detroit Magazine, and The Macomb Daily. Hunch Free is currently working on launching The Colaborative LLC, a shared ground floor workspace to house startups and other smaller tech

Our Early Childhood Center at Seminole is fully licensed by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) and houses Great Start and Head Start as well as Early Childhood Special Education alongside our K-3 program. In our smaller district, teachers have time to individualize instruction and provide personal contact. Further, staff and students have an attitude of personal passion and involvement. Christmas Tree Pickup

A special yard waste collection truck is picking up Christmas trees on your regular garbage day until January 24th. Please make sure that trees are bare and not in a plastic bag when placed at the curb.

Winter Snow Removal

Please keep in mind the Street Department will be clearing all major streets first during a snowstorm. We will, however, plow the side streets as quickly as possible once the major streets are clear.

This winter during snowstorms, please park your vehicles at an off-street location. Parking in a driveway or parking lot will be greatly appreciated. On-street parking can resume after the City has plowed the streets.

Whenever there is an abundance of snow accumulated or there is a possibility that snow will accumulate to extraordinary depths, the City may declare a "Snow Emergency" per City of Mount Clemens Ordinance #30.030. Local television and radio news stations will be alerted when a snow emergency has been declared and cancelled. Tune in for this information during snowstorms or excessive snow falls.

After the initial notice of a snow emergency has been declared, please remove all vehicles within six (6) hours on any major streets and/or within twelve (12) hours on local streets or alleys. Vehicles not removed from the streets during a Snow Emergency may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense. Once the entire street has been cleared of snow from curb to curb and no additional snow has accumulated or is predicted to accumulate, or the Snow Emergency $_{\bullet}\,$ beyond the CPI increase. Any loss has been terminated, vehicles may then resume parking on that street.

The Mount Clemens Train Depot – Supporting Our History

The Mount Clemens Train Depot is located at 200 Grand Avenue west of the downtown area in the City of Mount Clemens. It was built in 1859 as a passenger depot along the Grand Trunk's Port Huron to Detroit line. The Depot was designated a Michigan State Historic Site in 1973 and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1981. Since 1980, through a lease agreement with the City, the Michigan Transit Museum has occupied and helped care for the buildings and grounds. The Michigan Transit Museum was established in 1973 as a non-profit corporation to compile and record historical data on mass transportation systems and equipment, and to collect, preserve, display and operate such equipment.

Since 2010, the City has partnered with the Michigan State Historic Preservation Office and the federal National Park Service on two grant projects for the exterior rehabilitation of our historic Train Depot. As a Certified Local Government through these agencies, the City has been able to utilize special grant funds to complete the repair

and restoration of exterior brick and masonry, the repair and painting of exterior woodwork and arched brackets, and the rehabilitation and painting of exterior windows on the south facing wall. These projects have amounted to an approximate \$50,000 investment into the Train Depot. The majority of this funding has come from the Federal Government, including Community Development Block Grant Funds, which have been used as the local match for the previous two grant projects.

The City is currently in the final stages of submitting a third grant application for the replacement of the roof at the Train Depot, which would complete the exterior rehabilitation of this important resource. This project has a projected budget of \$40,000, of which \$24,000 would be funded by the National Park Service. As a part of the grant application, the City Commission has adopted a resolution which commits up to \$16,000 in City funds to be used for the local match. This was necessary due to no Community Development Block Grant funds being available

for this grant cycle. While the City has committed to supply this funding, the goal is to seek corporate and private donations to offset the local match amount. The Michigan Transit Museum has agreed to assist in the fundraising effort. Very recently, the Mah-Nah-Be-Zee Questers #198 have agreed to commit \$2,000 towards the \$16,000 local match.

As we enter the winter months, please take some time to consider a donation to the Michigan Transit Museum for the roof project. The Michigan Transit Museum is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, run entirely by unpaid volunteers. Any donations • received in excess of the \$16,000 would be used towards rehabilitation projects of the other structures at the Train Depot property.

Value for the following year. From that point forward, the Taxable Value is capped until the next transfer.

Physical Changes

Any change in Assessed Value due to a physical change will also change the Taxable Value • in value would be subtracted and any new value would be added after applying the Inflation Rate Multiplier/CPI. All assessments are based on what is physically on the property as of each December 31st. Most maintenance items such as roofs, siding, windows, etc., are not considered as a physical addition to the property.

Inflation Rate Multiplier/CPI

 Every year the State of Michigan calculates the Inflation Rate Multiplier. The multiplier is calculated by statute, on the Consumer Price Index (CPI), as measured by the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics and is based on a two year average of the consumer price index using the state's fiscal year. All property • in Michigan will have an average • increase based on the Inflation Rate • Multiplier or 5% (whichever is lower). The 2014 Inflation Rate Multiplier/CPI is 1.016.

Market Value

The Assessed Value represents 50% of a property's Market Value. The figure is calculated through a study of sales in the City for a two year period. The State regulated dates • for the two year study time frame are • 10/1/2011 through 9/30/2013. The • City is divided into nine (9) different study areas and sales in each area • are evaluated to establish the percentage that values will change.

Foreclosures

The State Tax Commission has issued specific guidelines regarding the inclusion of foreclosure sales in assessor's sales studies. These guidelines require the assessor to review each foreclosure sale utilizing • the established criteria. The assessor makes a determination based on • the guidelines whether to include specific sales in the study.
